

N THE MIDST OF THIS UNPRECEDENTED YEAR, THE SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION IS CLOSELY monitoring the impacts of COVID-19 on higher education, the demand for our scholarships, and the academic plans of individual students.

We recently surveyed our 2020-21 scholarship recipients about the impacts of COVID-19 on their families and academic plans. Over 2,000 recipients responded, and their replies make one thing clear: now more than ever before, your support is critical.

Marine families must know they can continue to rely on the Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation as a stable anchor for their children's academic futures.

Academic Impact

- ★ 99 percent of students continued their education, attending classes online or in-person in the 2020-21 academic year.
- ★ 50 percent of students attended classes completely online.
- ★ Our Marine Scholars are determined to push forward with their educational plans. Whether that education takes place online, or in a socially distanced classroom, they are not delaying the pursuit of their degrees or certifications.

Economic Impact



47 percent of scholarship recipients indicated their family incomes have been negatively impacted by the pandemic.



45 percent of scholarship recipients indicated that their ability to pay for school has been negatively impacted (a 96% increase from our survey conducted in the fall).



33 percent of scholarship recipients face long-term uncertainty about their family's economic future.
